

FOUR SCOTTISH DANCES

I. PESANTE

These dances were composed early in 1957, and are dedicated to the BBC Light Music Festival. They are all based on original melodies but one, the melody of which is composed by Robert Burns.

II. VIVACE

The first dance is in the style of a slow strathspey -- a slow Scottish dance in 4/4 meter -- with many dotted notes, frequently in the inverted arrangement of the "Scottish snap." The name was derived from the strath valley of Spey. The second, a lively reel, begins in the key of E-flat and rises a semi-tone each time it is played until the bassoon plays it, at a greatly reduced speed, in the key of G. The final statement of the dance is at the original speed in the home key of E-flat.

III. ALLEGRETTO

The third dance is in the style of a Hebridean song and attempts to give an impression of the sea and mountain scenery on a calm summer's day in the Hebrides. The last dance is a lively fling, which makes a great deal of use of the open string pitches of the violin (saxophones in the band edition).

SONG FOR LYNDSAY

Song for Lyndsay was commissioned by Jack Stamp at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. It is an expansion on a short and unnamed piano piece that Boysen wrote for his wife, Lyndsay, in 2005.

The wind piece is larger in length and scope than the source material; in the score, Boysen describes it as "a very personal work...more than anything else a simple love song dedicated to Lyndsay and what she has meant in my life.

OF OUR NEW DAY BEGUN

Of Our New Day Begun was written to honor nine beautiful souls who lost their lives to a callous act of hatred and domestic terrorism on the evening of June 17, 2015, while worshipping in their beloved sanctuary, the historic Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church (affectionately referred to as "Mother Emanuel") in Charleston, South Carolina. My greatest challenge in creating this work was walking the line between reverence for the victims and their families, and honoring my strong, bitter feelings towards both the perpetrator and the segments of our society that continue to create people like him. I realized that the most powerful musical expression I could offer incorporated elements from both sides of that line - embracing my pain and anger while being moved by the displays of grace and forgiveness demonstrated by the victims' families.

This work was commissioned by a consortium led by Dr. Gary Schallert and Dr. Jeff Bright of Western Kentucky University to honor the nine victims and families of the June 17, 2015, terrorist attack on Mother Emanuel A.M.E. Church in Charleston, SC.

Fairest of the Renaissance Faire takes melodic themes and motives from John Phillip Sousa's march **The Fairest of the Fair**. These melodic materials are transformed into a Renaissance-esque context, with inspiration drawn specifically from William Byrd's **Fitszw**illiam **Virginal Book** and Tielman Susato's **La Danserye**, both of which have very successful arrangements for concert band.

CONCERTO FOR BASS TUBA, I. PRELUDE

JáTtik Clark, featured soloist

Vaughan Williams composed his *Concerto for Tuba* for the golden jubilee of the London Symphony Orchestra in 1954 with the orchestra's own tuba player, Philip Catelinet, as the soloist. While the three-movement piece is relatively short, it still demonstrates Vaughan Williams' own harmonic and rhythmic style.

The Prelude is a brisk march that shows off the tuba's agility with little groups of fast notes and scalic passages. The middle section (in compound time) sounds like a grotesque cousin of "Nelly the Elephant" that eventually recapitulates back to the opening march. The movement ends with a florid cadenza that exploits the very highest and lowest registers of the instrument concluding with a series of wide leaps and a slow recall of the main theme.

LA CHANCLA

La Chancla is Spanish for a slipper -- more accurately, a flip flop. While Cubans usually say "chancleta", Puerto Ricans refer to it as "chancla." It is a common meme or joke among Hispanics that a mother with a chancla in her hand could get an entire room of unruly kids in line or even chase away a bear (look it up on YouTube -- it happened!). It is the Excalibur of Hispanic mothers and grandmothers everywhere, and so I thought it would be a fun project to write a piece with this title and play between the mythical and merengue.

The mythical element to La Chancla is represented by a combination of whole tone and octatonic collections. The merengue stands in stark contrast to the mythical representing the culture through more conservative functional harmony but intense rhythmic vitality. The piece is not programmatic -- just a fun collection of these styles and the interplay between them.

This work was commissioned by a consortium of band programs led by Thomas Verrier and Vanderbilt University. Tom had the vision of creating a work that was to be donated to bands in the Latin Americas who had limited budgets to purchase music. For every participating institution of this consortium, a copy of La Chancla will be donated to a band in the Latin Americas.



Brant Staai has been the Director of Bands at Sherwood High School since 2013 where he directs the Marching Band, Wind Ensemble, Concert Band, Bowmen Band, and Percussion Techniques. Additional responsibilities include coordinating chamber music ensembles, directing the Basketball Band, and coordinating the design team for the Sherwood Marching Band.

Mr. Staai earned his Masters in Music Education in 2008 from the American Band College in Ashland, Oregon. He earned his bachelor degree in Music Education in 2003, and his teaching credentials in 2004, from the University of Oregon. He is a member of Oregon Music Education Association, the Oregon Band Directors Association, the National Band Association, and Phi Beta Mu. He served as President on the executive board of the Northwest Association for the Performing Arts from 2017-2020 and as Past President from 2021-2022.

In 2015, he was selected by the Portland Youth Philharmonic to receive the Mary Dodge outstanding music educator award. In 2022, 2023, and 2024 he received a Citation of Excellence from the National Band Association for his work with the Sherwood High School Wind Ensemble. For the 2023-2024 school year, the Sherwood High School Band received a Program of Excellence - Blue Ribbon Award, for the Northwest Division from the National Band Association.

Brant lives in Sherwood with his wife Katrien, and three children Jack, Grace, and Dean.

TRISTAN WEITKAMP ASSOCIATE BAND DIRECTOR

Tristan Weitkamp is currently a band director at Sherwood High School and coordinates the jazz ensemble activities for the Sherwood School District. Tristan previously served as the Interim Director of Bands and Visiting Instructor of Music at Portland State University. He holds a Master's in Music: Instrumental Conducting and a Master's of Education, as well as a Bachelor's in Jazz Studies, from Portland State University. He also completed post-bachelorate studies in music and global affairs at the University of Cape Town in South Africa. During his time abroad, Tristan performed with notable South African musicians Dizu Plaatjies and Tony Cedras and recorded his first record, "Flash in the Pan," with his New Horizons Ensemble. Tristan currently co-manages a big band with saxophonist Nathanael Ankeny and directs the Providence Hospital Stage Band. He has also founded Sherwood Summer Jazz, a new summer jazz camp and festival based in Sherwood, Oregon.



JÁTTIK CLARK FEATURED SOLOIST



JáTtik Clark was appointed Principal Tuba of the Oregon Symphony in the Spring of 1999. Since that time, he has become a frequently engaged and highly regarded orchestral, chamber and solo musician while also cultivating and enjoying prodigious success as a private teacher, collegiate instructor and clinician at the local, regional and national levels.

In addition to the Oregon Symphony, JáTtik also currently serves as Co-Principal Tubist of the Grand Teton Music Festival and Principal Tubist of the Oregon Bach and Sunriver Music Festivals. He is also the tubist with the multi-recorded and acclaimed Rose City Brass Quintet based in Portland, OR. As a teacher, JáTtik is in high demand as he holds multiple adjunct instructor positions at several colleges/universities, including Oregon State University, Portland State University, and the University of Portland.

JáTtik has been featured and recorded as a solo artist on many occasions. This includes several solo features with the Oregon Symphony over his tenure, with the latest being the West Coast premier of the Concerto for Tubist and Orchestra by Wynton Marsalis. He has also enjoyed multiple solo engagements with the Grand Teton Music Festival, the Portland Columbia Symphony and the Vancouver Symphony (WA). Additional solo performances and recordings include Clackamas Community College Wind Symphony, the Salem Chamber Orchestra, the Corvallis-OSU Symphony and OSU Wind Ensemble, and the "Pershing's Own" United States Army Band in Washington D.C.

Mountainside has embraced its mission to connect with our community, explore new experiences, and pursue our goals towards our future from the start. Our students pursue their academic goals using the "IB for All" philosophy. The Mountainside Wind Ensemble has established a strong record of excellence over the past 9 years. Since the school opened, the ensemble has earned qualifying scores for all applicable years of the OSAA State Band Contest and has placed in the top five at every appearance. In the spring of 2025, they had the highest honor of tying for first place for the OSAA 6A State Band Championship competition, the first team state title in school history.

In just a few years, Mountainside High School and its music programs have built a legacy of academic rigor, artistic diversity, and performance excellence. We are excited, proud, and honored to showcase our community at this year's Oregon Music Education Association Conference.

Sherwood High school serves over 1,600 students grades 9-12. Known as the “Bowmen,” Sherwood High School students work together to maximize their potential in high school and beyond. It is the mission of Sherwood High School to equip each student to be a **lifelong learner, an engaged citizen, collaborative & communicative, resilient & responsible, and happy & healthy**. To that end, the school is committed to providing an exceptional academic program with Advanced Placement (AP) and dual-credit options, as well as a wide variety of extracurricular and co-curricular activities and athletics. Sherwood High School’s Career & Technical Education (CTE) offerings include programs in construction, woodworking, culinary arts, architecture, engineering, and computer science. The performing arts department features an award-winning band and choir program, and a robust theater program which produces multiple plays and musicals each year, and Sherwood High School’s auditorium seats 600 with robust sound and lighting systems.

Beyond a comprehensive, robust education, the wide range of options at Sherwood High School ensures that every student has a place to grow and thrive. 
The Sherwood School District takes pride in its comprehensive band program, which spans both the Sherwood Middle School and Sherwood High School communities and includes numerous ensembles. At the high school level, there are three concert ensembles, two jazz bands, a comprehensive combo program, a competitive marching band, winter percussion, winter guard, and a robust chamber music program. At Sherwood Middle School, students begin their musical journey in homogenous beginning band classes, differentiated Intermediate and Advanced Bands, as well as having the opportunity to perform in two different jazz bands, a cadet winter guard, cadet winter percussion ensemble, and many solo & ensemble opportunities.

The Sherwood High School Wind Ensemble, under the direction of Brant Stai, performs concert literature of all varieties spanning centuries of composers and arrangers and builds on a legacy of achievement. In 2020, the Wind Ensemble was selected to perform at the Oregon Music Educators Conference, premiering Andrea Reinkemeyer's composition *Smoulder*, a National Band Association William Revelli Composition Award Finalist. The Wind Ensemble was also selected to perform at the 2017 All-Northwest Music Educators Conference in Bellevue, Washington. In the spring of 2024, the Wind Ensemble performed in the World Projects' New York Sounds Of Spring Festival at the prestigious Carnegie Hall.

While the high school band program focuses on music education, we also compete at regional and national festivals and competitions. The Wind Ensemble consistently places in the top five in the 6A OSAA State Band Contest. Each fall, the Sherwood Marching Band & Colorguard consistently places in the top five in the Northwest Association for the Performing Arts Marching Band Championships. In 2022, the Sherwood High School Winter Percussion Ensemble earned first place in the Percussion Scholastic Open Class at the WGI Percussion Championships in Dayton, Ohio. This year, the Sherwood High School Band Program was awarded the 2023-24 Programs of Excellence - Blue Ribbon Award for the Northwest Division from the National Band Association.

Our band programs are supported by our Sherwood Bands Booster Club, comprised of parents, guardians, friends, and alumni. They dedicate their time and expertise to our middle and high school band programs through volunteering, fundraising, and promoting appreciation and interest in the band program among the surrounding community and businesses.

The Sherwood band program strives to create memorable musical performances and make a lasting artistic impact on our schools, community, and musicians. Our priority is to help our students become great people as they develop great musicianship.

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
